We are incredibly grateful and humbled by the bill's passage, the near-unanimous support in the Legislature, and the sponsorship by the University of California. We also deeply appreciate the letters of support from many of the active stakeholders who heavily lean on CHBRP analyses, and the campuses from which CHBRP draws its faculty task force.

Given the dynamic drivers of health, effective policy-informing requires a multidisciplinary lens and a keen understanding of the complexities of health care. We partner with several health policy and health services research centers and institutes, and we continue reaching out to new ones. Towards that end, we're delighted to officially join as a partner organization with the California Research Bureau (CRB) Nexus. The CRB Nexus is a community of California researchers, practitioners, policymakers, and organizations committed to public policy solutions informed by data-driven research. In collaboration with the State Library, partner organizations seek to promote and translate evidence and foster the next generation of public scholarship aimed at identifying and solving policy issues. What happened to the bills that made it to the Governor's desk this year? Of the 13 bills analyzed by CHBRP in 2025, 7 were sent to the Governor's desk. Of these, one was signed into law and 6 were vetoed. Marilyn Moon, PhD

Dr. Marilyn Moon has been a member of CHBRP's National Advisory Committee since 2002 when the program began, providing essential insight and perspective. In her reviews of analyses, she helps ensure CHBRP's analyses can be understood by lay audiences and break down complex information and terms for general members of the public. Dr. Moon values the different perspectives that CHBRP brings together and the knowledge she gains from reading these



reports.

Dr. Moon has an extensive background in health policy economics. Her last position was as a Senior Fellow at the American Institutes for Research and before that managed approximately 130 staff members in their health program. She helped to inform consumers, providers, and policymakers about aging issues, delivery system innovations, and approaches to Medicare and Social Security Reform. She also served as a Trustee for Medicare and Social Security.

Moon started her career in health policy through academia, writing her dissertation on the economic status of the economic well-being of older Americans. Her research led her to connect economics and health, and after finishing her PhD she went to Washington, D.C. to work as a Medicare analyst at the Congressional Budget Office. She is most proud of working to create changes in Medicare and being able to stay true to her convictions as she worked on health reform.

Although Dr. Moon largely retired in 2017, she still engages with the health policy space in multiple ways beyond working with CHBRP. Recently, she authored an essay for Medicare's 60th anniversary in Health Affairs and is currently co-authoring a book titled "Is it Right for Me?". "Is It Right for Me?" is a book on retirement housing, how people can make choices when thinking about their next 15 years, and the different housing and health care options available. She enjoys being able to jump into different topics at her own pace without worrying about funding and supervisors.

Alan Weil, JD, MPP

Alan Weil serves as a member of the CHBRP NAC, using his breadth of experience in health policy to review CHBRP's analyses for accuracy and clarity. He says the most rewarding part of being on the CHBRP NAC is the opportunity to read the excellent evidence-based policy analysis prepared by the staff. He finds it interesting to see what the California Legislature thinks needs to be addressed in policy and enjoys CHBRP's systematic approach to looking at changes to insurance regulation.



Mr. Weil is currently the Senior Vice President for public policy at AARP analyzing health, financial, and community issues for persons 50 and older. He enjoys being able to analyze a breadth of issues through the lens of the people affected by them, rather than just focusing on a specific program or topic. He has a side interest in city and regional planning, specifically topics on designing communities that support people as they age.

Initially interested in social policy, Alan found himself accidently drawn into health policy after he completed his graduate schoolwork which focused on employment and welfare. He has since held many impressive roles such as the Editor in Chief of Health Affairs, the Executive Director of the National Academy for State Health Policy, a Center Director at the Urban Institute, and a member of the Governor's Cabinet in Colorado.

During his career, Mr. Weil is most proud of being a leading part of Massachusetts's health reform, which eventually became the foundation for the Affordable Care Act. Mr. Weil is also proud of his involvement in the 1990s efforts to convince governors to advocate for keeping Medicaid out of the federal welfare reform block-granting plan, thereby protecting coverage and maintaining national standards for the program.



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
